Wolves no longer live in New York State. They also don't live in many other places around the United States. Why? Over a hundred years ago, people wanted to get rid of the wolf. They thought the wolf was a pest. They feared it. So wolves were driven away or killed. Some hunters were even paid to kill wolves. To this day, wolves haven't returned to many places around the country.


Think about these questions:

Wolves move in packs. The Wolf Pack Movement video on the BOCES 4 Science website (or the picture below) shows the wolf packs in Voyageurs National Park. It is a park in northern Minnesota. The wolves had GPS collars on them. The data from the GPS allow us to see where the wolves travel in the park.



What do you notice about where and how the wolves travel?

If you said that wolves move within their **territory**, you are correct! The middle of their territory is often the center of their pack. Most of their time is spent there. It is a place where they feel safe. Their dens are often in the center of their territory. Mothers give birth in this area, too.

Different packs avoid being around each other. Wolves give warning signals to other packs. Packs may be found together to fight for food. Wolf packs may also fight each other for territory.

Look at the travel patterns of each pack again. Is there one wolf pack that seems more **aggressive** than the others?
